

Australian Shakuhachi Festival

Canberra Feb 10-13 2006

This is the seventh festival, and is the major event for the Australian Shakuhachi Society. The Festival will be as full as ever, we hope with more teachers and participants than before.

The accommodation at University House is hotel-like, and there are plenty of conference rooms for the workshops. The Festival Concert will be in the Great Hall, part of University House. With no travel time to this event, we will have an extra afternoon for workshops.

The Festival will cater for shakuhachi enthusiasts of all levels, from professional to total beginners.

As always, a highlight of the Festival will be the Festival Concert, this time held in the splendid Great Hall at University House.

SPECIAL "TOTAL BEGINNERS" PACKAGE:

For the first time ASF2006 will be offering total beginners a special package. Beginners can register for tuition only (four special "total beginners only" workshops, plus private lesson), and admission to the Festival Concert for only \$225. ASF2006 Update.

The registrations for the Australian Shakuhachi Festival 2006, Canberra 10-13 February, are beginning to trickle in. There has also been a number of bookings for the Festival Concert on 11 February.

Members who haven't booked yet have until 10 January to do so and still be eligible for the 'early bird' rate.

The Society is pleased with the strong response from its koto friends. It seems that there will be as many as a dozen of koto teachers and participants at the Festival, including several from Japan. Odamura sensei will be joined by her Sawai Koto School colleague, Ms Kageyama, who will help with the tutoring.

Also, the Festival will be welcoming for the first time, shamisen specialist Ms Kikukoya, also from Japan. She plans to come together with her koto accompanist. Needless to say, koto/shakuhachi ensemble pieces will feature in many of the workshops, and in the Concert.

A number of 'total beginners' have already made enquires. This is very good news! The Society hopes to attract at least 10 or 15 total beginners. Please encourage all of your friends/family to consider registering as a 'total beginner'. The registration fee for beginners is half the price of the normal fee, but one has to be completely total novices, eg, without an instrument (we provide them) and having never made a sound. Please help get the word out! Tell everyone you can think of who might be interested!!!

Obituary Notice - Nonie Greene

Nonie Greene, a member of our shakuhachi community, passed away on 29 November in Lismore. She was taught by Riley Lee and Bronwyn Kirkpatrick, and most recently by Stuart Ransom. Many of you have met Nonie at past shakuhachi Festivals.

Stuart said, "I have been teaching Nonie for the last couple of years at Byron Bay. She had bravely continued to come for lessons, when able, throughout her illness. She loved the shakuhachi and it was at least one thing that gave her hope and enjoyment."

We ask all members to remember Nonie, perhaps by playing *Tamuke* for her. We will dedicate the traditional group performance of *Tamuke* to Nonie, at ASF2006 in Canberra next February.







Shakuhachi at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music.

From next year, for the first time ever (as far as we know), the shakuhachi will be offered as a principle instrument of study in an accredited tertiary institution outside of Japan. Dr. Riley Lee will begin teaching shakuhachi next year at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music, which now includes the former Music Department at the University of Sydney.

The shakuhachi has been offered at a number of universities in the USA and elsewhere for a number of years. For example, Riley began teaching shakuhachi at the University of Hawaii in 1980. Riley's student Robert Herr still teaches shakuhachi at UH. Also, Wesleyan University had resident shakuhachi teachers, including the master Yamaguchi Goro, in the 1970s. But the shakuhachi was always only offered as an elective and usually as part of a musicology degree course, rather than a degree in performance.

The details of the Sydney Conservtorium shakuhachi programmes are still being finalised. It appears however, that the first student to be accepted to the programme will be Riley's shakuhachi student and fellow TaikOz performer, Kevin Man. Kevin will be doing a Masters Degree (Research), with his principle instrument of study being the shakuhachi. Another student, from overseas, has also applied to study with Riley next year as an undergraduate.

Riley said, "I hope that the programme that the Con and I are devising will be like the one that I always dreamed of taking early in my shakuhachi career, but which did not exist. Though there are a couple of universities in Japan where one can study the shakuhachi, the programme here will differ substantially in a number of key aspects. The biggest differences will be a greater emphasis placed on becoming a professional within the mainstream international music scene, and of course, the programmes here will be taught in English.

"I hope that this small beginning will lead to something muchbigger. I can imagine, eventually, an entire department for nonwestern musical instruments at the Sydney Conservatorium. But I look forward especially to the time when there are 10-15 shakuhachi students at the Conservatorium at any given semester.

"The shakuhachi is becoming more and more an Australian instrument with each year. The members of the Australian Shakuhachi Society should be very pleased. This development can, in part, be considered one of the fruits of their labours."


A word of appreciation.
